- c) the author's name with current affiliation, contact details (email) and a short biographical note (around 200 words),
- c) an indication when the presentation could take place. Available dates are: 06.09.2023; 06.12.2023; 03.01.2024; 07.02.2024; 06.03.2024; 03.04.2024; 08.05.2024; 05.06.2024.
